7.2 NOTES AND REFERENCES

- 1** Payne has 4 examples of Bremersdorp No.3 (SQ.S) in blue ink (16.11.1891 to 30.5.1892) and 27 examples in black ink (25.7.1892 to 4.10.1894). He has three examples of the BONC, fig 2a, in blue ink, and 9 examples of fig 2a or 2b in black ink. It would be of value to further explore this hypothesis.
- 2** Proud illustrates a T in a circle Taxe mark. Uncertainty exists about it having been applied in Hlatikulu.
- 3** This date is questionable as Swaziland only became a Protectorate of the ZAR on 21 February 1895.
